




# Franklin County Solid Waste Management District

- 15 of 19 transfer stations
- Special drop-off in the Town of Gill

# FOOD & PAPER WASTE COMPOSTING

FREE\*! At Deerfield Transfer Station













- Commercial Composting reduces household trash by 30% or more:
  - Accepts ALL types of food (except liquids)
  - paper towels, napkins, BPI-certified paper takeout containers
    - \*Free to permit holders

#### Deerfield Transfer Station

- Since 2019
- Started w/ 2 cubic yard dumpster (pictured)
- 6 months later, increased to 4 cubic yard
- Energy Committee vols.
   assisted program launch
- Estimated 83 tons/year
- 2020 population: 5,090
- Permit holders: 1,291



## Montague Transfer Station (Turners Falls)

- Since March 2021
- 4 cubic yard dumpster
- Also has curbside pickup of MSW, recyclables
- Drawdown Montague vols. assisted program launch
- Estimated 83 tons/year
- Potential MSW tip fee savings: \$7,802
- 2020 population: 8,580



## Whately Transfer Station

- Since 2003
- First or second municipal program in the state!!
- 2 cubic yard dumpster
- Estimated 40 tons/year
- 2020 population: 1,607



# Conway Transfer Station

- Since 2019
- Started w/ 2 cubic yard
   Triple T Trucking dumpster
- 10 months later, switched haulers
- Compost Cooperative hauls to Martin's Farm
- 64-gallon toters stored in trailer (bears in area)
- Estimated 16 tons/year
- 2020 population: 1,761
- Permit holders: 1005



#### Best Management Practices



- Weekly pickup
- Resident education
- Signage
- Trash can next to compost bin for plastic bags, mistakes
- Provide kitchen pails
- Make the program free to permit holders
- Report successes to the community



# Montague Composts!

TURNERS FALLS - Montague's new free residential composting program at the recycling and transfer station has gotten off to a great start. Since the program started in mid-March, many town residents have started composting – quite a number for the first time. Many have been using the countertop compost pails that have been available for free at the Transfer Station. These are available as of this writing on a first-come, first-served basis at the Transfer Station, but supplies are limited. Other folks have been using pots, large containers, paper bags, and buckets of various types to collect their compost in.

- Since 2024
- Town doesn't have a transfer station
- 3 toters in a dog kennel at a municipal building
- Residents get lock combo
- Energy Committee vols.
   assisted program launch
- Town-wide mailer
- Estimated 12 tons/year
- 2020 population: 1,551



#### Home compost bins Keep food waste local - at home!







YES: compost fruit, veggies, peels, bread, pasta, coffee grounds, tea, leaves, garden and yard waste

NO: animal products (meat, bones, cheese)

Save money on trash disposal and purchasing garden soil and compost for home gardens.

#### Low-cost compost equipment sold:

- FCSWMD office, Greenfield
- Several FC transfer stations Earth Machine Compost Bins:
- \$25 \$65 (Most towns subsidize) Sure-Close compost pails:
- \$5 \$10

## **School Composting**







### Organics = 82% of cafeteria waste by weight!



Trays: stacked, then composted

451 lbs. compost/week cafeteria and kitchen

97 lbs. trash/week cafeteria and kitchen

# Don't forget the school kitchen!

#### **HS School Kitchen:**

- Same 32-gal barrel as cafeterias
- 2-3 compost barrels on wheeled dollies.
- BMP: Roll out to compost dumpster; do not lift and carry compostable bags.



#### Small school kitchen:

- 23-gallon compost barrel;
- 5-gallon trash pail
- 1 lb. of trash/ day!



#### Pioneer Regional School (Grades 7 – 12) Northfield, MA

First HS Compost Program in MA?

Started in 2000: 17 waste stations around the school







#### Compost Bin in School Garden





MA schools can get free compost bins from MassDEP's free K-12 educational program The Green Team. thegreenteam.org

YES: fruit, vegetables, bread, leaves, garden waste, grass clippings

NO: meat, bones, cheese

- 2 tons organics to Martin's Farm

- Weekend after Labor Day
